3. King David is a great example of someone who faced the skeletons in his life. One of these skeletons was an affair he had with a neighbor's wife and a cover-up that included the murder of her husband. What "closet cleaning" steps do you see David taking in Psalm 51:1-17?

When it comes to dealing with your own skeletons, is there any part of David's prayer that would be helpful for you to use?

What challenges or benefits can you see from taking the "closet cleaning" advice given to us in James 5:16?



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
