7 Things to keep in mind...

- 1. Expect opposition (vs. 1-3)
- 2. Check for seeds of truth (v.3)
- 3. Pray boldly and honestly (vs. 4-5)
- 4. Focus on the <u>task</u> Not your <u>opponent</u> (v.6)
- 5. The criticism may intensify before it dies down (vs.7-9)
- 6. The greatest threat is discouragement (vs.10-12)
- 7. Protect <u>yourself</u> but don't <u>retaliate</u> (vs.13-23)
